ETHIOPIA: ETHIOPIAN AIRLINES TO START NEW YORK JFK FLIGHTS

IMF EXPECTS MOZAMBIQUE TO BECOME ONE OF THE LARGEST ECONOMIES IN AFRICA

By 2028 Mozambique could become one of the largest economies in Africa when production of natural gas discovered in the north reach its peak, said the International Monetary Fund (IMF) in a recent report.

According to the IMF Mozambique's economy will grow 24 percent between 2012 and 2025 before falling back to growth of 3-4 percent in 2028.

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) considers that in the middle of the next decade half of Mozambique's GDP will come from natural gas, but recommends a cautious approach given the sector's sensitivity to international conditions.

In 2010, Mozambique found 180 billion cubic metes of gas in the Rovuma river basin, in the northern province of Cabo Delgado. This gave the country the equivalent of Nigeria's entire gas reserves.

The IMF also believes that Mozambique may be the world's third largest gas exporter after Qatar and Australia, when production reaches its peak. (22-01-2016)

SUDAN AND ETHIOPIA WILL CONCLUDE THE DEMARCATION OF THEIR DISPUTED COMMON BORDER DURING THE YEAR 2016

The head of the technical committee tasked with redrawing the border between Sudan and Ethiopia Abdullah Al Sadig said it would complete its work on the ground during this year.

He told the media in Khartoum that the border demarcation between Sudan and Ethiopia does not face any further problems.

He pointed out that the length of the border with Ethiopia is about 725 kilometres, saying the process of demarcation is proceeding smoothly.

Farmers from the two sides of the border between Sudan and Ethiopia used to dispute over the ownership of land in the Al-Fashaga area located in the south-eastern part of Sudan's eastern state of Gedaref, which, together with Blue Nile State border Ethiopia's Amhara region.

The borders between Sudan and Ethiopia were drawn by the British and Italian colonisers in 1908.. The two governments have agreed in the past to redraw the borders, and to promote joint projects between people from both countries. (APA 18-01-2016)

ZIMBABWE: U.S. PROVIDES ADDITIONAL U.S.\$5 MILLION IN HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE TO ZIMBABWE

In response to worsening drought conditions and increased food insecurity, the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) has announced an additional \$5 million contribution to the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) for humanitarian assistance to Zimbabwe.

This brings total U.S. Government funding for humanitarian assistance to Zimbabwe to \$32.5 million since June 2015 following a poor harvest across the country.

According to the Zimbabwe Vulnerability Assessment Committee, an estimated 1.5 million rural Zimbabweans will be food insecure in the first three months of this year. This figure is likely to increase if El Niño, as predicted, causes continued drought and a poor April - June 2016 harvest.

USAID's additional \$5 million contribution will support WFP's Productive Asset Creation activity starting in May 2016 and will provide food rations or cash transfers to benefit over 80,000 individuals in eight districts across Zimbabwe over a six-month period. In exchange for the food rations or cash transfers, beneficiaries will participate in the creation or rehabilitation of community assets, including irrigation systems and dams, to improve infrastructure and livelihoods for the future.

"USAID is proud to support the World Food Programme to help vulnerable Zimbabweans cope through this difficult drought," said USAID/Zimbabwe Mission Director Stephanie Funk. "This program addresses immediate food security needs while gradually helping vulnerable communities build resilience to climatic shocks and eliminating the need for food assistance in the long-term."

With total contributions of \$32.5 million, USAID is working with its implementing partners WFP, World Vision, and Cultivating New Frontiers in Agriculture to scale up food security programs across ten districts in Manicaland, Masvingo, and Matabeleland North and South, reaching 450,000 people with humanitarian assistance.

In order to target and coordinate the U.S. Government's response to El Niño, USAID Director of Southern African Affairs and the leader of USAID's working group on El Niño, Bradley Bessire, is visiting Zimbabwe this week to see first-hand the scope and severity of the current lean season and El Niño's impact on food security in Zimbabwe.(US Emb)

MOZAMBIQUE GUARANTEES WATER SUPPLY DESPITE SEVERE DROUGHT

The general manager of Mozambique's southern regional water board (ARA-Sul) has assured that the supply of drinking water for Maputo is guaranteed despite the current drought ravaging the southern regions of the country, APA observes here on Monday.

According to state-controlled Radio Mozambique, Banze said that, even if the current drought persists, the Pequenos Libombos dam has enough water to supply the city for up to two years.

The dam is on the Umbeuzi River, and controls the flow of the river, which is the main source of the water consumed in the capital.

Banze said currently the dam is discharging a constant four cubic metres of water a second, and that is sufficient for the Maputo water supply, although he also urged consumers to use water rationally.

We are urging people to restrict their use of water, he said in an apparent criticism to those residents of Maputo who are using water for such superfluous activities as washing their cars.

We have to prepare ourselves for the implementation of restrictive measures, he warned.

According to the broadcaster, Banze had returned from visiting the three main dams in the south of the country the Pequenos Libombos dam on the Umbeluzi, the Corumana dam on the Sabie, and the Massingir dam on the Elephants river, the major tributary of the Limpopo.

He warned of impending measures to restrict the use of water for agriculture, in order to prioritise human consumption.

Everywhere south of the Zambezi river, the forecast is for rainfall that is below normal for the immediate future.

The drought is blamed on the El Nino, weather phenomenon, an anomalous increase in the temperature of the surface waters of the Pacific Ocean, which has a major impact on the world's weather patterns.

Scientists say the drought has been worsened by an exceptionally strong El Nino weather pattern, in the eastern and central Pacific that occurs every few years with ripple effects around the globe, scientists say.

El Nino events typically bring drier conditions to Southern Africa and wetter ones to East Africa. The dry, hot conditions are expected to persist until the start of the southern hemisphere autumn in April or May.

SONANGOL WILL SEARCH FOR GAS IN 540 SQUARE KILOMETRES OFF THE COAST OF ANGOLA

The Government of Angola has granted the rights to natural gas development and production in an offshore area of 540 square kilometres to state oil company Sonangol, Portuguese news agency Lusa reported.

Lusa said mining rights were granted to Sonangol to develop and produce hydrocarbons in the area of block 2/15, in a total of 512.8 square kilometres, and the 6/15 block, with an area of 34.085 square kilometres.

The concessions are for six and three years, respectively, for the research period, and an additional 20 years, in both cases, for production from the date of the declaration of commercial discovery of natural gas.

The first concession (block 2/15 and neighbouring areas of block 3) results from the discovery of gas on drilling the Garoupa Oeste well, in which Sonangol intends to carry out the evaluation, development and production of gas, and to "identify additional resources" in the area.

The second concession focuses on the Cegonha well of block 6/06, where Sonangol is responsible for development and production of natural gas. That area was previously handed back to the Angolan State, after the initial research phase ended, which declared the well in question was commercially viable.

Angola's total oil reserves are estimated at between 3.5 billion barrels (proven) and 10.8 billion barrels (probable).

The country is the second largest oil producer in sub-Saharan Africa, with daily production of about 1.7 million barrels of crude oil. (21-01-2016)

UFM-PALESTINE TALKS ON THE STATE OF PLAY OF EURO-MEDITERRANEAN COOPERATION AND REGIONAL CHALLENGES

The Palestinian Minister of Foreign Affairs and Cooperation, Dr. Riyadh Al-Malki, paid an official visit to the Union for the Mediterranean (UfM) Secretariat on 19 January, during which he held talks with the Secretary General, Fathallah Sijilmassi.

The visit provided the opportunity to discuss Euro-Mediterranean cooperation and regional challenges, as well as Palestine's active involvement in UfM initiatives and projects.

The discussions also focused on the UfM-labelled project "<u>Desalination Facility for the Gaza Strip</u>", which aims at building a large-scale desalination facility and its associated water supply infrastructure that will supply drinking water to more than 1.8 million Palestinian inhabitants of the Gaza Strip, thereby presenting a long-term solution for the chronic and longstanding water shortage in Gaza.(UfM 20-01-2016)

ETHIOPIA GETS \$50M FAO EMERGENCY PLAN TO PROTECT LIVESTOCK

The Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO) on Monday announced a \$50 million emergency response plan to urgently protect livestock and rebuild crop production in drought hit parts of Ethiopia. The plan aims to assist 1.8 million farmers and livestock keepers this year to reduce food gaps and restore agricultural production and incomes.

The first phase of the \$50 million plan will focus on the Meher season that falls between January and June.

The response will include a mix of emergency seed distribution, small scale irrigation projects, backyard gardening initiatives targeted at empowering women's groups with tools, knowledge and access.

As the current drought has not only affected smallholder farmers but also seed produces, it has aggravated already existing seed shortages across the country and made it even harder for farmers to plant.

Another 293 thousand households will benefit from livestock interventions, such as the distribution of emergency animal feed, vaccination drives to protect some three animals against diseases. (APA 18-01-2016)

ISRAEL INTERESTED IN INVESTING IN AGRICULTURE AND WATER IN ANGOLA

The Israeli ambassador to Angola, Raphael Singer said in Namibe that his country was interested in investing in the agricultural sector and water in Angola contributing to the diversification of the Angolan economy and combating desertification, particularly in Namibe province.

The diplomat recalled that Israel's experience of the wilderness can be used in recovering Namibe desert areas for agriculture through irrigation systems already tested successfully in Israel.

"The technology we are using in irrigation systems in Israel's arid areas can serve as a model for Namibe" the diplomat also said.

Singer said Israel was also interested in investing in the fisheries sector and that would be one of the topics to discuss with the government of Angola in due course. (21-01-2016)

ITALY-TUNISIA: CROSS-BORDER COOPERATION AND THE CHALLENGE OF MEDICAL TECHNOLOGIES

According to the <u>Italy-Tunisia ENPI Program</u>, "Digital technologies in the field of diagnosis imaging have led to profound changes in hospital services and in the diagnosis capabilities offered to practitioners. In this regard, huge commercial opportunities are open to companies well beyond the Mediterranean." The <u>AIDA</u> Project was launched for this goal (self-immunity: computer assisted diagnosis); it is funded under the ENPI-CT Italy Tunisia 2007-2013 Program with an amount of 1.7 million Euros for a total period of 30 months. AIDA's initial results were presented on January 12, 2016 in Tunis.

<u>The Italian-Tunisian cross-border cooperation program</u> (CBC) supported by the EU (in the framework of the European Neighborhood and Partnership Instrument (ENPI) involves five provinces from Sicily (Agrigente, Caltanissetta, Raguse, Syracuse, Trapani) and six Tunisian coastal regions (governorates of Ariana, Béja, Ben Arous, Bizerte, Jendouba, Nabeul). The main goal of the program is to promote the economic, social, institutional and cultural integration between neighboring countries in this part of the Mediterranean.((AIDA 19-01-2016)

MINING COMPANY WARNS OF UNFAIR COMPETITION IN MOZAMBIQUE

Montepuez Ruby Mining (MRM), a company that explores ruby deposits in Montepuez, warned the Cabo Delgado provincial authorities of the unfair competition that illegal miners represent, according to a company representative.

MRM, a partnership with Mozambican company Mwiriti Ltd. 75-percent controlled by UK company Gemfields, in February 2012 was granted a 25-year concession covering an area of 33,600 hectares for exploration of ruby deposits in that northern province of Mozambique.

Company director Saul Muchine, told Mozambican daily newspaper Notícias that illegal mining of rubies was increasing, with miners exporting the gems without paying any taxes on them, unlike MRM.

In 2015 Montepuez Ruby Mining was considered the largest taxpayer in the province of Cabo Delgado, having delivered about 320 million meticais (US\$7 million) to the Tax Authority, due as a result of ruby auctions. (19-01-2016)

SUDAN READY FOR INTERNATIONAL ARBITRATION OVER BORDER DISPUTE WITH EGYPT

The Sudanese government said it is ready to go to the international arbitration court to end the disputes with Egypt over the border area of Halayeb triangle.

The head of the border technical committee Abdullah Al Sadig confirmed to the press in Khartoum on Monday that there were documents to prove that Halayed is a part of Sudanese territory.

Al Sadiq pointed out that Sudan has not engaged in meetings with the Egyptian side on Halayeb, saying the issue could be referred to international arbitration as was the case during the dispute between Egypt and Israel over the Taba area.

"We don't oppose the referral of the case to international arbitration to resolve the issue particularly as Sudan has maps as well as legal and historical documents proving that Halayeb and Shalateen are part of the Sudanese territory" he said.

Earlier this month, Sudan's Foreign Minister Ibrahim Ghandour told a group of Egyptian politicians in Cairo that the dispute over Halayeb area cannot be resolved by "imposing a fait accompli" but through dialogue or by referring the case to the concerned international institutions.(APA 18-01-2016)

E-COMMERCE DRIVES UPSURGE OF COURIER SHIPMENTS IN KENYA

In the parking lot outside Africa Internet Express' (AIX) warehouse in Nairobi's Baba Ndogo estate, close to twenty semi-trailer trucks and a hundred motorcycles, decorated with logos of different companies providing courier services, wait to be loaded with packages for delivery across the country to consumers who shopped online.

Africa Internet Express (AIX) saw the blessings of e-commerce in Kenya and moved fast to incorporate established and growing logistics providers into a single network to provide a constant stream of business through the consolidation of sales volumes from two e-commerce marketplaces; Jumia and Kaymu and meet the exponential needs of online shoppers and sellers.

Jonathan Parisot, MD Africa Internet Express (AIX) Kenya said, "Every day we process thousands of orders from Jumia and Kaymu customers for delivery across the country within a specified timeline. Customers want delivery made fast and cheap. That efficiency is what our platform is built on and with e-commerce growing fast, it's going to be one big party for logistics/courier companies that match up."

AIX Express is also the vehicle Jumia rode in to partner with courier service companies such as Aramex, Posta Kenya and G4S to establish offline pick-up points that would allow customers to shop online and pick up the item from an office near them.

Pulling a similar stunt and in a move to bolster online user safety and ease delivery of goods, OLX signed a partnership with G4S mid this month that will see sellers on the platform deliver shipments to the nearest G4S collection centre for dispatch to the buyers within Nairobi region. This brings to four the number of e-commerce retailers G4S has signed a similar deal, others include Kilimall and Melimu.

Geoffrey Mwove, Chairman Courier industry association and the Director of courier at G4S Kenya said, "We have had a 30% upsurge of courier shipments driven by booming e-Commerce trade. The last half of 2015 as confirmed from industry players data, we saw a reduced traffic due to slow down in government related procurement this was however compensated by e-commerce transactions."

Leading the pack among online food retailers in Kenya is Hellofood a platform that lists hundreds of restaurants across Nairobi and Mombasa on which you can order for food from your favourite restaurant and have it delivered to your office or home across the two cities within an hour where you pay on delivery.

To ensure efficiency, Hellofood outsources the services of maduka a local courier service while restaurants selling on its platform such as Debonairs, Artcaffe and Thai village among others deliver through an in-house courier company.

Duncan Muchangi, MD Hellofood Kenya notes, "Food delivery service is on demand driven by a young middleclass generation with tight work schedules that prefers to have their meals delivered to them, if you deliver on time, they will buy from you again. It's a delicate balance for any efficient logistics company. If you get it right, you win."

According to Mwove, most courier companies have identified e-commerce as a high potential growth driver and are aligning to grow their retail outlets by training personnel, interfacing technology and fleet to deliver in agility and reliability at the lowest price possible. NAMIBIA: CONSTRUCTION OF POWER PLANT TO BEGIN SOON DESPITE CONTROVERSY

Construction of the controversial power plant by Xaris Energy in the Erongo region is expected to start as soon as the company conclude a power purchase agreement with national power entity, Namibia Power Corporation (NamPower), Xaris CEO Hennie Steyn told the reporters.

Much of the ground work has been done including the necessary environmental impact assessments and putting in place of supplier and partner agreements. Due diligence on the project has more or less been concluded. Construction will commence as soon as the Power Purchase agreement has been agreed between Xaris and NamPower, he was quoted as saying.

The 250 MW gas power projects (including power station, floating storage and regasification unit and pipe line infrastructures) will take 15 months to complete and expected to shield Namibia from total power blackouts expected next year.

Namibia is pondering on long-term generation projects including the much talked about Kudu Power Station, and the Baynes Hydro Power Project in the Kunene region.

The multi-billion dollar power plant to be constructed near Walvis Bay has been surrounded by controversy, following media reports individuals aligned to ruling party Swapo, including the party's secretary general Nangolo Mbumba, have direct interests in Xaris Energy.

On Monday, a local daily reported that President Hage Geingob and Prime Minister Saara Kuugongelwa-Amadhila arm-twisted cabinet to agree on Xaris project, despite objections from the Ministry of Mines and Energy and energy regulator Electricity Control Board.

Mines Minister has earlier made submission to Cabinet that the project expected to cost N\$7.6 billion (about \$452 million) be scrapped as it was not economically viable. (APA 18-01-2016)

ANGOLA REDUCES OIL PRODUCTION IN DECEMBER 2015

Angolan oil production declined in December 2015 to 1.751 million barrels per day, 17,200 barrels per day less than in the previous month, according to the monthly report from the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) published recently.

All together, the 12 OPEC countries reduced their production from November to December by 210,600 barrels per day. In total, OPEC, citing "secondary sources" in December produced 32.182 million barrels of crude oil per day.

The largest drop in production was recorded by Nigeria (-77,200 bpd) and Saudi Arabia (-57,700 barrels per day).

According to the OPEC report, China's crude oil imports increased in November from the previous month, reaching an average of about 6.6 million barrels per day.

Angola remains one of China's leading suppliers, although Angolan exports of crude oil fell in November, as did those of Saudi Arabia and Oman. (22-01-2016)

MOZAMBIQUE: CHINA COURTS PARTNERSHIP TO MANUFACTURE BUSES

A high-profile Chinese delegation representing the Asian nation's Ministry of Trade and the Xiamen Golden Dragon Bus Co. has left Mozambique after a week-long visit t look into the possibility of a partnership in public transport, APA learnt on Monday.

State run daily newspaper, Noticias reported that members of the delegation visited the Matchedje Motor car assembly plant at the weekend, in the industrial city of Machava, in Maputo Province to get acquainted with the unit, whose capacity could be enhanced to produce even more buses in the country.

According to Noticias, the Xiamen Golden Dragon Bus Co., a subsidiary of the King Long Group, one of the largest bus manufacturers in China, will focus the potential partnership in Mozambique on providing technical support to Matchedje Motor Ltd in the bus segment.

The managing director, Sandra Song, said the company was currently operating at a reduced level as it is building a 590-hectare industrial park in Maluana, in Maputo province.

The project involves an increase in production to 100,000 vehicles per year by 2017, following which there will be a new expansion phase to about 500,000 vehicles.

The Matchedje Motor project, established just over four years ago, is the result of an investment by the China Tong Jian Investment Co. Ltd, and at this initial stage is operating with two assembly lines, an painting area and another area for inspections.(APA 18-01-2016)

SOVEREIGN FUND OF ANGOLA SUPPORTS SOCIAL PROJECTS IN SEVEN PROVINCES

The Angola Sovereign Fund for Development (FSDEA) is financing 10 projects in health, education, water supply and entrepreneurship in the provinces of Cabinda, Bengo, Huambo, Bié, Cunene, Benguela and Kwanza Norte valued at US\$12 million.

As oat of the FAI's actions the "Kijinga" programme has also been launched, aimed at the reconstruction of the old "Super" soap factory. (21-01-2016)
